How to PLAY IT SAFE

Check your home for these potentially **deadly poisons** and **remove them** from children's reach:

- Medicine cabinet: Medicines (prescription and over-the-counter), vitamins, creams
- Under the sink: Cleaning products, insecticides
- Drawers, containers, purses: Alcohol, tobacco, marijuana-related products, e-cigarettes
- Other: Hobby/craft supplies, plants, hand sanitizer

Don't disguise dangerous substances. Store them in their original containers **up, away, and out of reach** of young children.

Consider a **lockbox** if you have older children/teens and concerns about potential misuse.

DID YOU KNOW?

Child-resistant containers are not 100% childproof. But they delay access to a bottle's contents.



When to SEEK HELP

Call 911 immediately if child is

- Losing consciousness
- Having difficulty breathing
- Showing significant skin color changes
