

Medicaid is Vital to Georgia's Children

Medicaid is a public health insurance program designed to help people who otherwise could not afford health coverage.

Medicaid is a lifeline to children and families in Georgia and is built with children's unique needs in mind.

67% of people enrolled in Medicaid in Georgia are children



Medicaid pays for 45% of Georgia births

Helps ensure access to critical prenatal care, maternity care, and postpartum services.



Medicaid covers 42% of all Georgia children

Insures children in low-income families and nearly all children in foster care.



Medicaid covers 48% of children in Georgia with special health care needs

Provides medical, behavioral health, and long term care for children with special health care needs and disabilities.



Medicaid is the largest source of federal funding for mental health services

Supports mental and behavioral health treatment for children, adolescents, and adults.

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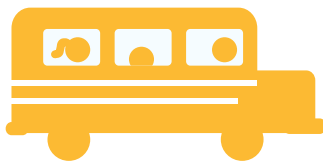
The federal government contributes \$1.98 to Medicaid for every \$1 Georgia invests.



51% of federal funding sent to Georgia is for Medicaid, which is about \$9.4 billion annually.
